CHOOSE

Tuesday

WHY THIS IS CORRECT

A keeps all the ideas (the bell rang, Beth shouted, students pushed back chairs and hurried) with new words. That is a true paraphrase.

WHY THE OTHER CHOICES ARE ANSWER TRAPS

B adds an idea the passage never states (late for lunch). C reverses the meaning (stayed in their seats). D leaves out most of the ideas, so it is not complete.

WHY THIS IS CORRECT

A keeps both ideas (the warm sun on her face, and the breeze in the trees) with new words. That is a true paraphrase.

WHY THE OTHER CHOICES ARE ANSWER TRAPS

B adds an idea the passage never states (rain). C reverses the meaning (cold, no wind). D leaves out the wind and the trees, so it is not complete.

WHY THE OTHER CHOICES ARE ANSWER TRAPS

B adds an idea the passage never states (took it home). C reverses the meaning (next to the ocean). D leaves out that it came from the coast and was far inland, so it is not complete.

WHY THIS IS CORRECT

A keeps both ideas (people lacked some resources nearby, so they traded for goods from far away) with new words. That is a true paraphrase.

WHY THE OTHER CHOICES ARE ANSWER TRAPS

B adds an idea the passage never states (never trusted traders). C reverses the meaning (had everything). D leaves out the trading, so it is not complete.
