A Quote Is Not Automatically Strong

How can we decide whether a piece of evidence is strong enough to prove our thesis (central idea)?

Which proves the idea better? Is every quote automatically strong evidence?

A quote is not automatically strong evidence.

★ Dot the Tricky Words

Day 1 · Gather & Reveal

D

Dot

Place a small dot above any word you are not sure about yet.

O

Discover

Discover the meaning as we learn together through our lessons.

T

Drop

Erase the dot once you know what the word means.

A little dot above a word means:
“I’m not sure about this word yet.”

Dot the word. Discover the meaning. Drop the dot, then celebrate when you own it!

C

Connect

Does the quote connect to the prompt?

S

Support

Does it support the thesis (central idea)?

I

Infer

Can it help us infer something important?

Announce evidence with a **signal phrase** and **quotation marks**.

A quotation is evidence; a well-chosen quotation that passes CSI is STRONG evidence.

★ What Counts as Evidence?

Evidence vs. Summary

Evidence = exact words from the text in quotation marks.

NOT evidence = “People grow food.”

Watch Me!

Given Thesis (Central Idea): The setting is important because people depend on farming and trade.

Answer Reveal: The setting is important because people depend on farming and trade. The text says, ‘Corn, beans, and squash grew in long rows’ and ‘They brought pottery and tools to trade.’

test with CSI

Answer · Strong Evidence

C: connects to village setting/community? **S:** supports an idea about trade or cooperation? **I:** can we infer people depended on one another?

Why Was It Strong?

How did it **Connect** to the prompt?

What part of the thesis (central idea) did it **Support**?

What could a reader **Infer** from it?

Why would another quote be weaker?

Student Directions: “Connect to the Overarching Question: How does CSI help us decide whether evidence is strong enough?”

Use CSI: Connect to the prompt, Support the thesis (central idea), Infer something meaningful.

QUOTE

Given Thesis (Central Idea): The author shows the setting through details about the environment. *Add evidence that proves the environment.*

CSI

Add one or more strong pieces of evidence that pass CSI. *Announce the evidence with a signal phrase and quotation marks.*

SWEEP

After you write your evidence sentence: confirm it is a complete sentence; check subject-verb agreement in the sentence around the quote; check your high-frequency spelling; and confirm the quoted words match the passage exactly.

Add one or more strong pieces of evidence that pass CSI. Announce the evidence with a signal phrase and quotation marks.

Small-Group Support

Sort each sentence: **EVIDENCE** = exact words + quotation marks. **NOT EVIDENCE** = a paraphrase or general statement.

“Corn, beans, and squash grew in long rows”

“People grow food.”

“They brought pottery and tools to trade”

Support Frame: “The text says, ‘___.’ This shows ___.”

If it is not in quotation marks, it is not evidence.

★ A Promise Written Long Ago · Morning in the Village

“The king collected heavy taxes and made unfair decisions.” “The barons wanted the king to follow rules.” “They brought pottery and tools to trade.”

Let's Look at an Answer!

Prompt: Why is the setting important to the people in Tayanita's village? (Prove your thesis (central idea) with strong evidence that passes CSI.)

LOW Level 1

"The setting is important because people grow food. The village has crops and trades with others." (Level 1)

What Is Working: The student states a thesis (central idea) and names farming and trade.

Teacher Notes: There is no quoted evidence, only a summary, so the idea is not proven with the author's exact words.

What Needs Improvement: Add exact quotes with a signal phrase and quotation marks that pass CSI.

Let's Look at Another Answer!

Prompt: Why is the setting important to the people in Tayanita's village? (Prove your thesis (central idea) with strong evidence that passes CSI.)

MEDIUM Level 2-3

"The setting is important because people depend on farming. The text says, 'Corn, beans, and squash grew in long rows.'" (Level 2-3)

What Is Working: A thesis (central idea), a signal phrase, and one exact quote that connects and supports.

Teacher Notes: One quote proves farming; a second quote would strengthen the response and support an inference about the whole community.

What Needs Improvement: Add a second strong quote (about trade) and connect both to the thesis (central idea).

Our Strongest Answer!

Prompt: Why is the setting important to the people in Tayanita's village? (Prove your thesis (central idea) with strong evidence that passes CSI.)

HIGH Level 3-4

"The setting is important because people depend on farming and trade. The text says, 'Corn, beans, and squash grew in long rows' and 'They brought pottery and tools to trade.'" (Level 3-4)

What Is Working: A clear thesis (central idea) with two exact quotes, each announced correctly, that connect to the prompt, support the thesis (central idea), and let the reader infer that the community depends on cooperation.

Teacher Notes: Both quotes pass CSI and work together, exactly what strong evidence looks like.
