Build a Foundation You Can Defend

How do a clear claim, logical reasons, and relevant evidence create the foundation of a strong argumentative response?

A claim takes a position. A reason tells why that position makes sense.
Evidence proves the reason from the text.

When those three jobs are clear, the argument has a strong foundation.

★ Dot the Tricky Words

Dot

Place a small dot above any word you are not sure about yet.

O

Discover

Discover the meaning as we learn together through our lessons.

T

Drop

Erase the dot once you know what the word means.

A little dot above a word means:
“I’m not sure about this word yet.”

Dot the word. Discover the meaning. Drop the dot, then celebrate when you own it!

The strongest logical supports
for the claim.

E

EVIDENCE

Exact or accurately paraphrased
proof from the text.

Understanding Others · Rebuttal · Ending · Significance.

Read the Prompt, Build the Foundation

Test Every Part

Claim the position you will defend

Reasons the strongest logical supports for the claim

Evidence exact or accurately paraphrased proof from the text

Ask: *Does it match the prompt? Does it support the claim? Can the passage prove it?*

Watch Me!

Prompt: Argue whether protecting trade or supporting learning had the greater impact on Mali.

R, Reason 1: Safe routes encouraged more merchants to travel to Mali. **E, Evidence:** 'He made sure traders could move safely, which brought more people and goods into Mali.'

When those three jobs are clear, the argument has a strong foundation.

Reason + Evidence

Safe routes encouraged merchants to visit Mali. Proof: ‘He made sure traders could move safely, which brought more people and goods into Mali.’

Strong writers do not grab the first fact they see.

What Makes the Foundation Strong?

A claim takes a side; a topic only names the subject.

**a claim that takes
a defensible side**

**reasons that are
logical and distinct**

**evidence that proves
the exact reason**

A true detail can be weak if it does not match the reason.

“The passage explains that jobs in the Coastal Plains include farming, fishing, and working in big cities.”

Let's Look at an Answer!

Prompt: Argue whether protecting trade or supporting learning had the greater impact on Mali. Use evidence from the passage to support your position.

LOW

“Mansa Musa was good and trade was good.”

What Is Working: The response names Mansa Musa and trade.

What Needs Improvement: State a defensible claim, add a logical reason, and use relevant evidence from the passage to prove the reason.

Let's Look at Another Answer!

Prompt: Argue whether protecting trade or supporting learning had the greater impact on Mali. Use evidence from the passage to support your position.

MEDIUM

“Protecting trade had the greater impact on Mali. Safe routes helped trade. Mansa Musa made sure traders could move safely.”

What Is Working: The response takes a position and includes a relevant passage detail.

What Needs Improvement: Make the reason more precise, identify the detail as evidence, and explain how the evidence directly proves the reason.

Our Strongest Answer!

Prompt: Argue whether protecting trade or supporting learning had the greater impact on Mali. Use evidence from the passage to support your position.

HIGH

“Protecting trade had the greater impact on Mali because safe travel increased commerce and helped the kingdom grow. Safe routes encouraged more merchants to travel to Mali. The passage states that Mansa Musa ‘made sure traders could move safely, which brought more people and goods into Mali.’”

What Is Working: The claim is clear and defensible, the reason is logical, and the evidence accurately and directly supports the reason.
