How can accurately understanding another viewpoint help us write a stronger and more respectful rebuttal?

“Argumentative writing is not about making the other side sound foolish.”

Understand the other view accurately, then answer it with evidence.

★ Dot the Tricky Words

Day 1 · Gather & Reveal

D

Dot

Place a small dot above any word you are not sure about yet.

O

Discover

Discover the meaning as we learn together through our lessons.

T

Drop

Erase the dot once you know what the word means.

A little dot above a word means:
“I’m not sure about this word yet.”

Dot the word. Discover the meaning. Drop the dot, then celebrate when you own it!

★ Understanding Others and Rebuttal

U

UNDERSTAND

I can represent another viewpoint accurately, respectfully, and specifically.

R

REBUTTAL

I can write a rebuttal that answers the actual point with reasoning and evidence.

✓

BE FAIR

The other viewpoint would agree that I represented the idea accurately. My wording is respectful and specific.

Fair frames: ‘Some readers may argue that...’ · ‘Another reasonable view is...’

Rebuttal frames: ‘However, the stronger evidence shows...’ · ‘That point matters, but...’

My rebuttal directly answers the point with reasoning or evidence, and my original claim remains clear or becomes more precise.

★ Fair Viewpoint, Strong Rebuttal

Day 1 · Reveal (cont.)

Fair or Unfair?

Round 2 ‘Some people think learning is dumb.’ = UNFAIR U

Round 1 ‘Some readers may argue supporting learning mattered most.’ = FAIR U

Listen for whether the rebuttal actually uses reasoning or evidence.

Watch Me!

U, Understanding Others: Some readers may argue supporting learning mattered more because Timbuktu became a center of study.

R, Rebuttal: That point is strong, but protected trade had a broader immediate effect.

This response acknowledges the value of learning while explaining why the evidence for protected trade matches the claim.

How to Play

- 1 Draw a claim card.
- 2 Draw two possible U viewpoint cards.
- 3 Choose the fairest, most accurate viewpoint.
- 4 Build a rebuttal using one piece of text evidence.
- 5 Partner checks: ‘Would the other side agree this represents the view fairly?’

Success Check: *Represent the alternate viewpoint accurately, use respectful language, respond to the actual point raised.*

Evidence-Based Rebuttal

That point is important; however, protected trade affected the whole kingdom by bringing more merchants, goods, and wealth into Mali.

★ Accurate Representation

Day 3 · Discuss (cont.)

★ Daily Deck

The most important Grade 4 habit is accurate representation: students should be able to hear the other side say, ‘Yes, that is what I meant.’

The other viewpoint would agree that I represented the idea accurately.

My wording is respectful and specific.

My rebuttal directly answers the point with reasoning or evidence.

Reframe it as evidence-based response.

CLAIM + R/E/T

Write a clear claim. Build one strong reason/evidence/thinking chain.

UNDERSTAND

Write one accurate ‘Some readers may argue...’ sentence.

REBUTTAL

Respond with ‘However...’ or another respectful rebuttal frame. Use evidence or specific reasoning in the rebuttal.

SWEEP

Read the U sentence as if you held that viewpoint; revise if it sounds unfair. Edit reflexive pronouns and the assigned capitalization categories.

Other viewpoint is accurate and fair; rebuttal directly answers it with reasoning/evidence; original claim remains clear.

Day 5 · Educate & Explain to Others

★ Daily Deck

How can accurately understanding another viewpoint help us write a stronger and more respectful rebuttal?

“U proves we listened accurately. R proves we can respond with evidence. A strong rebuttal answers the real other viewpoint, not a weaker version of it.”

Explain why a rebuttal is not an insult or a repeated claim.

Sort viewpoint sentences as FAIR or UNFAIR.

“Unfair: ‘People who care about learning do not understand trade.’”

“Fair: ‘Some readers may argue learning had a greater long-term impact.’”

Language Support: “Some readers may argue that...”

Read the U sentence as if you held that viewpoint. Respect the idea, do not attack the person.



Refine the Claim

Enrichment · Write in your notebook

Challenge: Write a fair U and a strong R.

Then decide whether the other viewpoint reveals a weakness in your original claim. Revise the claim if needed and explain why refinement makes the argument stronger.

Another reader would agree that I represented the viewpoint accurately.

My rebuttal responds to the exact point.

My claim remains clear or becomes more precise.

★ Citizenship in Action

“Because traders knew they could travel safely, more merchants visited Mali.” “During his pilgrimage, Mansa Musa gave away large amounts of gold to people in need.”

Let's Look at an Answer!

Prompt: Argue whether protecting trade or supporting learning had the greater long-term impact on Mali.

LOW

Some people think learning is dumb.

What works: The sentence signals that another view exists.

What needs improvement: It misrepresents the viewpoint and uses dismissive wording. It does not explain the real reason that could support learning.

Let's Look at Another Answer!

Prompt: Argue whether protecting trade or supporting learning had the greater long-term impact on Mali.

MEDIUM

Some people think learning was better. They are wrong.

What works: The response names learning as another position.

What needs improvement: The viewpoint is vague, and the rebuttal neither answers the point respectfully nor uses reasoning or evidence.

Our Strongest Answer!

Prompt: Argue whether protecting trade or supporting learning had the greater long-term impact on Mali.

HIGH

Some readers may argue that supporting learning had the greater long-term impact because Timbuktu became a respected center of study. That point is reasonable; however, protected trade affected the kingdom more broadly by bringing more merchants, goods, and wealth into Mali.

What works: The viewpoint is accurate and specific, the response is respectful, and the rebuttal answers the actual point with passage evidence while keeping the original claim clear.

★ **This is our target!**
