MEANING

Monday

Sample: “The lunch line behind them came to a stop.” Same meaning, new words.



CHOOSE

Tuesday

A is best. It keeps the meaning (in about half a minute, the investigation was out of control) with new words. **B** changes the meaning to the opposite (stayed calm). **C** drops how fast it happened, so it is not complete.



SAY

Wednesday

Sample: “Eli said he had heard the sixth graders each took two.” Same meaning and facts, new words.



REBUILD

Thursday

Sample: “Fifth grade had a problem by 11:42 on Friday morning.” The words and order change, but the facts stay.

TAP paraphrase: “Jordan pointed at the empty tray where the cookies used to be.” THINK: This shows the cookies really were missing, which starts the whole mystery. The paraphrase is the evidence, not the explanation.

Correct answer: A Jordan looked through the cafeteria window and announced that every one of the cookies was gone.

WHY THIS IS CORRECT

A keeps both ideas (Jordan looked through the window, and all the cookies were gone) with new words. That is a true paraphrase.

WHY THE OTHER CHOICES ARE ANSWER TRAPS

B adds an idea the passage never states (blaming Maya). C reverses the meaning (plenty left). D leaves out that the cookies were gone, so it is not complete.

Tuesday

A is best. It keeps both ideas (he would not steal cookies, and he has other things to do) with new words. **B** changes the meaning to the opposite (loves stealing). **C** drops the point that he would not steal, so it is not complete.

Correct answer: A In under a minute, the investigation got out of hand, with Eli claiming that sixth graders each took two cookies.

WHY THIS IS CORRECT

A keeps both ideas (the investigation quickly got out of control, and Eli's claim about sixth grade) with new words. That is a true paraphrase.

WHY THE OTHER CHOICES ARE ANSWER TRAPS

B adds an idea the passage never states (Eli proved it). C reverses the meaning (calmly agreed). D leaves out the investigation and the claim, so it is not complete.

WHY THIS IS CORRECT

A keeps both ideas (fifth grade helped, and she corrected that they surveyed students) with new words. That is a true paraphrase.

WHY THE OTHER CHOICES ARE ANSWER TRAPS

B adds an idea the passage never states (a prize). C reverses the meaning (caused the problem). D leaves out what she said, so it is not complete.

WHY THE OTHER CHOICES ARE ANSWER TRAPS

B adds an idea the passage never states (extra credit). C reverses the meaning (does not want ideas). D leaves out why the challenge was given, so it is not complete.
